May turned out to be a great day considering the weather we had been having, not a drop of rain for which we are thankful. Top shooters were:

#1 Doc Roy L Pain, #2 Dodge City Dick, and #3 Led Foulin'.

June 19 we will be having a special shoot which we are calling "A Shot Through History". There will be five stages representing a different event from late 1890 to 1927. *THIS WILL BE AN ALL LEAD BULLET EVENT*.

Five Categories:

- 1. Cowboy 1 single action revolver, 1 lever action rifle (pistol caliber) and 1 shotgun (legal for cowboy)
- Double action 1 double action revolver (adjustable sights allowed; preferred early style double action revolvers), 1 bolt action or lever action box magazine rifle (bolt action rifle must be in military configuration; NO optical sights), and a shotgun (pump or double barrel – NO semi-autos)
- 3. Semi-auto pistol could be Luger, 1911 (Kimber or any 1911 style), Mauser 96, any pre-1927 (please, NO race guns), 1 bolt action rifle (must be in military configuration; NO optical sights), and a shotgun (pump or double barrel – NO semi-autos)
- 4. Double action revolver with lever action pistol caliber rifle and a shotgun (pump or double barrel NO semi-autos)
- 5. Semi-auto pistol with lever action pistol caliber rifle and a shotgun (pump or double barrel NO semi-autos)

Lead bullets only, not hunting shotgun loads, #4 shot maximum, no magnum loads (due to steel targets being used).

There will be an \$11 fee. Try to dress in a period outfit as it will be judged. This event will be held on the same shooting range as our regular matches. Any questions call Mackinaw Kid after 4 p.m. at (248) 852-0351.

June 20th will be our regular cowboy shoot.

Our annual Pig-Out-Of-Luck pig roast will be held July 17th. Tickets are on sale now for \$15 per adult and \$8 per child (15 and under). Tickets can be

Shoots on the Road

Lucky Lennie aka L.L., Country Girl aka C.G., Cactus Kay aka C.K. and myself, Dakota Doc aka D.D. joined forces last October to shoot the Missouri State Championship just outside Branson. The shoot was conducted on an abandoned racetrack which crowded the stages together at one end of the oval. At the time, L.L. wasn't feeling too well but managed to outgun the competition. C.K. did all right.... managed to beat yours truly, which is getting to be a habit. L.L. and C.G. returned home for the holidays while C.K. and myself traveled to Texas to see grandkids and shoot. Which came first (kids or shoots)?

Had a couple of fun shoots which included a Christmas shoot and dance in Abilene. Small turnout.... large enjoyment. We were even invited back. Just in case you are keeping score C.K. won again. However, I shot the match clean. Well, almost clean. This match permitted miss pick-ups with the appropriate firearm. I reloaded two shots in the pistol for a clean match. I thought it added to the shoot, gave some practice for the speed reloads and was an added option to add flavor to the game. C.K. thought the people were nice and the Christmas dance was over a hundred-year tradition (there weren't a lot of young people dancing).

In late December we hooked up again with L.L. and C.G. and went to Smithville, TX for a club match. Needless to say, L.L. and C.K. weren't invited back. C.G. and myself were welcomed visitors. San Antonio was the next stop across the country. Ran into Tequila who is teaching shooting classes at the Kactus Korral outside of Gonzales, TX. Nice cowboy store, gun shop, and boasts one of the largest cactus sales in the U.S. They sponsored a booth at the Convention last year in Las Vegas. Nice people.

Traveled to Yuma, AZ and shot the Territorial Prison Breakout in mid-January. This shoot gets better all the time. Better props, bigger targets and a very interesting side event called the Death Star, or something similar. The crux of the matter is the following: Rifle port arms with six alternating shots, stage rifle on table, pick up shotgun for a ten shot run (these are falling targets.) The first shot releases a 16# bowling ball, which begins to roll

down an inclined ramp at a slow pace. With one eve on the rolling ball the shooter continues with nine more shotgun targets shooting as many as possible before the bowling ball releases a clay bird upon reaching the end of the rack. At this point, the shooter should be loaded and ready to shoot the bird. Shooter can always go back and pick up shotgun targets still standing after shooting the bird. The tenth shotgun target releases the Death Star to spinning, round and round. Shooter stages shotgun on table, steps outside prop wall and draws loaded pistol. The points of the star fall when hit, which causes the wheel to jerk in one direction or another as targets fall. Great side event. C.K. had shot the event clean, including the clav bird, proceeded to draw her empty pistol..... Won a Cow Butt Award for that stunt. These are awarded for doing something less than smart. (Trying to be politically correct, don't you know?) We all won some timber at that shoot. We even took in the local flavor and dropped into Mexico.

On to Winter Range where we teamed up with other Wolverine Rangers and had a great time. You have read about all the success in a previous Epitaph. Winter Range was propped bigger and better this year than all the other years since I have attended. Really was fun to shoot and pleasant to look at. Exactly what you would expect from a national match. Food court wasn't bad either.

Somewhere along the way we ended up at Stampede in Jean, NV. This was one of the rockiest places you will ever try to pull a gun cart around. Better wear some comfortable shoes as well. The props are getting old, needed paint and less complicated stages. Seven out of ten stages had "land mines" for the shooter. You really had to stay in the game mentally or you were in trouble. For some of us "old guys" this was hard. Top all this off with a posse marshal who was appointed the morning of the shoot and you had a recipe for disaster. L.L., C.K. and myself did timing and made some difficult calls. I think I wore out my welcome. The only smart one was C.G. She knew when to keep her mouth shut. Probably learned how from living with L.L. Next year Stampede, which had some trouble in the past, is moving to a new location, hopefully with fewer rocks and troubles. English Andy did as well as he could with what he inherited.

However, as difficult as Stampede was the New Mexico State Championship, in my opinion, was worse. They shoot on Fowlers Ranch, which was very picturesque. We parked in the wrong spot because of lack of communication, asked to shoot with Led Foulin' and Attitude Annie, and when L.L. asked about the location of the handicapped parking, we should've read the writing on the proverbial wall OUTCASTS. ____ TROUBLEMAKERS AND DAMN YANKEES! In L.L.'s own words to the high muck-de-muck and his compadre, "We can still make the Gathering of the Posses at Casa Grande" (which is held the same weekend). Since C.K. covered the New Mexico shoot in her article following, I'm all done except to say L.L. took a first in Senior Duelist, C.K. a first in Senior Lady, C.G. took third in Lady 49er, Michigander took an award in Elder Statesman and I had a clean match..... that's like saying "she has a really nice personality." We are looking forward to reporting more from EOT and Cajon and shooting with (Chili) Pepper and Colt (McAllister). At EOT I'm sure these cowboys will not be invited back either. Shooting – New Mexico Style

Seven of us Michiganders had the pleasure of shooting the New Mexico State Championship last March near Silver City. They were Lucky Lennie, Country Girl, Led Foulin', Attitude Annie, Dakota Doc, Cactus Kay and Michigander. We managed to garner two first places and three thirds in the regular match and two places in the side events. I think we put Michigan on the map for them!

This was their second state championship and they are still learning as we did. On the plus side of the equation was the fact that they worked very hard to put on the best shoot they knew how to do. The weather was perfect, in the seventies, and worked in their favor. Located at 7,000 feet, last year they had snow at the shoot! Big trees and shade also added to the flavor for me. In the southwest we see mostly warm, dry, desert conditions so the trees were more like home and a welcome change.

They have five great, permanent props with a lot of variety. We shot two stages at each site, so for a 10-stage match we only moved 5 times. Each site had multiple spots to shoot from so it gave us plenty of variety. Four of us got to shoot together and were put on a fun, capable posse of experienced and more than your average fast shooters. We had plenty of "workers" and that made it easy. We noticed that our posse did not seem to have any New Mexico shooters. They were from Colorado, Arizona, Michigan and Florida. I guess we were the "foreigners".

They were lavish with the awards, even if there weren't five in the category. The plaques were set up with place finished on them but not the category. Supposedly they will mail a metal plate with the shooter's name and category to put on the plaque in a space at the bottom. It personalizes the plaques and saves them from trying to guess categories ahead of time. I thought it was a great idea.

We shot on a private ranch out of town a ways. They talked the closest restaurant into opening early for the season. The owner ran hours from very early morning until late in the evening. She had a Saturday night buffet and they arranged for a cowboy singer for the evening. The restaurant personnel couldn't have been nicer.

They had the local 4-H Club come in and shag brass for their annual fundraiser. They did not pick up after each shooter but waited until we left the stage. It seemed very efficient and smooth. We only used a rake or broom if brass fell in the way of the next shooter. I thought it was a very speedy and unobtrusive way of handling the job. The really neat thing about it was they sorted the brass by caliber! At the auction you were only bidding on the caliber you wanted. They raised WAY more money that way than we have ever seen, even at the bigger shoots.

Now there were a few down sides for us. First of all they didn't honor posse requests to shoot with Led Foulin' and Attitude Annie. We all came a long way to get together and did manage to do that before and after the shoot, and at dinners but it would have been a lot more enjoyable to shoot together. This was a first for us. Usually shoot organizers bend over backwards to see that shooters enjoy themselves.

The range slopes away from the stages and we were always standing on an angle when we were not shooting. It took its toll on legs and knees of those that tend to have problems anyway. In addition, three of the props were made for very tall people. Being height challenged, as some would say, I had to be very careful. At one stage the halfdoor ledge where we staged our shotgun was at shoulder level for me. I could barely get my gun down!

The person that wrote the stages is back where we were some years ago. It looked like they thought the more complicated the shooting order the better. It was procedural heaven. I have never seen target order more difficult to remember. Not only were they complicated, but also rifle, pistol and shotgun were all different on the same stage. Lucky for us the timers were sharp and on the ball. They coached closely and saved us many times. We had surprisingly few procedurals but I pitied the less

experienced posses and timers.

The absolute worst of the shortcomings was the SHOTGUN targets. Most of them were metal cylinders about three inches wide and twelve inches long, suspended from a chain which was attached to a long metal rod leaning out of the ground on an angle. They reminded me of a fishing pole with the target attached. Not only were they small and hard to hit, they were very subjective targets. We could re-shoot the shotgun targets if the counters said it was a miss. The problem was counters had to be very fast and decisive to make that call and so many fast shooters were past the target before it was called a miss. I noticed that eventually they stopped trying to have people re-shoot a missed shotgun target. It wasn't a fair way to handle things and this was the best argument I've seen for having all knock down shotgun targets.

The last shortcoming I'll expound upon is picky, but it annoyed the heck out of me. They had really nice, sturdy, large loading tables that had indoor/outdoor plastic carpet attached to them. About half of them had carpet that was disintegrating. As I picked up each bullet I had to blow it off because tuffs of the carpet came with it and got in the gun. It was odd actually that no one thought to replace it for a state level match.

In addition, we had problems with parking and the spelling of our aliases. They were both pretty interesting tales, but I won't go there.

Now that I've picked the shoot to pieces I'll have to say we really enjoyed it. A lot of it has to do with the friends you are with and the posse composition. All of the shortcomings can be corrected, and since Led Foulin' and Attitude Annie are moving to Silver City in the very near future we will look forward to shooting there again. We will see if they have any influence. At one suggestion a month I figure it should take about a year. Let's hope Led and Annie don't get bounced out of the club!
