Well buckos, in this issue I'm going to go into detail about how to shoot. WHOA HOSS! You say....I already know how to shoot! Yeah, I know that, but remember, we're not gonna be shooting at a target that is only 30 feet away and we're not shooting against the clock. Long range is a different game and requires different technique. Let's start with the offhand [standing] position. In black powder ctg. [B.P.C.] silhouette, the first stage is chickens, offhand, at 200 meters. Your form must be as steady as possible. LIKE A ROCK! The key is BONE SUPPORT. Your rifle probably weighs 9 or 10 pounds. Trying to use something that heavy in the "traditional" rifleman's stance will quickly tire you. By quickly I mean 5 or 6 seconds. You'll start to wobble so much you won't be able to keep the chicken in the front aperture. Try this. Pick up the rifle and point it at the target. Tuck your left elbow snugly up into your body [if you're a right hander]...pull your left hand back so it is ON the trigger guard or JUST in front of it. Some people balance the rifle on their fingertips, others have the rifle in the palm of their hand. Take your pick which way is the most comfortable. The entire weight of the rifle is now transmitted through your forearm to a point on your body just above your hip bone. Now relax, get as comfortable as possible, and close your eyes for a few seconds with your rifle pointed at the target. Open your eyes. If the rifle has moved off target, SHIFT YOUR FEET SLIGHTLY to get back on target. What you are doing is finding your NATURAL POINT OF AIM. You don't move your arms to get on the target, YOU MOVE YOUR BODY. Now all you have to do is keep the target in the front aperture [ha! Easier said than done!] Here is when you may find out that you have too small an aperture installed in your front sight. Put one in that's large enough to keep the target inside of it the whole time you are aiming. You will find that over time, as you get steadier, you will be able to shrink the size of the aperture a little. Almost everybody I know uses an aperture insert, NOT a post insert.

Your eye naturally centers the target in the center of the aperture. You'll learn to love them once you get used to them. If you have a set trigger, set it when the rifle is pointed at the target. NOT BEFORE! It's REAL easy to have an accidental discharge if your finger touches a prematurely set trigger. If you have a single trigger, put some pressure on it as you are aiming at the target. [it's called "loading the trigger"] When the target is centered in the aperture, apply that last little bit of pressure to the trigger to "break" the shot. The whole secret is in the timing. Your eyes send a signal to the brain, your brain sends the signal to your trigger finger. You must PRACTICE enough to know the right time to SQUEEZE the trigger. Oh yeah. You can't flinch either. All I can tell you is that the more you practice at shooting at SMALL targets [100 yards.. 6 inch bullseye.. 200 yards..12 inch bullseye] the better you'll get. Nobody ever got good shooting at big, close targets. You get good shooting at small, distant targets. PRACTICE, PRACTICE, PRACTICE!

OK. Now that you've mastered the offhand position, let's concentrate on shooting from X-sticks. In Black Powder Target Rifle mid and long range prone events, there is no offhand stage. All shooting is done from either sitting or prone X-sticks. Now listen up Bub. Hardly anybody shoots these events from the sitting position unless they have some kind of physical reason for not being able to shoot prone [usually back problems]. Shooting from prone X-sticks is MUCH steadier than shooting from sitting X-sticks. [The only catch is you have more felt recoil... but that can be dealt with]. Stick your X-sticks firmly in the ground on the firing line. Have the pivot point of the sticks about 8 or 10 inches above the ground for starters. Lay down behind the sticks with your body at a slight angle to the target. Rest the barrel of your rifle on the sticks about 6 or 8 inches from the muzzle. Get comfy and aim your rifle toward the target. Scoot your body right or left to fine tune

your aim. You will notice that your sticks probably have to be adjusted a little higher or lower. Go ahead and adjust them and get back into shooting position. Your left hand should grasp the very back end of the rifle butt to hold and support it against your shoulder. Everything is adjusted correctly when your cheek position on the stock and your body position when holding the rifle feel PERFECTLY comfortable. No straining anywhere. Your sights are perfectly aligned on target. It's a good idea to measure how high the pivot point of the sticks is above the ground. Write it down so the next time you shoot you can put your sticks in the ground at the right height without having to adjust them several times. When shooting prone you have a natural point of aim too. If you have to strain or don't feel comfortable, you increase your chances of a crossfire [shooting at the wrong target.] Trust me on this....there are only two kinds of shooters.....those who have crossfired and those who are going to crossfire!

While I'm at it I might as well go over some of the other equipment you'll be using. A roll-up ground cloth or shooting mat will keep you out of the dirt and dew. Your spotting scope [the best you can afford] will be on your left. This allows you to lean slightly to your left after you shoot to see where the pit crew marks your hit on the target and to observe the mirage condition before your next shot. In the shooting box on your right within comfortable reach you will have your ammo, wiping rod and patches or blow tube, sight inserts, shooting glasses, ear muffs, sight settings and open action indicator.

I hope these tips will help you. I know that once you get confident that you can hit a target that is waaaaay out there, those close-in targets will be a lot easier to hit.
